### **About Sphere**

Back in 1975, Bill Gates was a 19-year-old bumming Harvard computer time to craft a BASIC language, and hackers Steve Jobs and Steve Wozniak were still dreaming of hawking their first circuit board. The curtain was opening on the personal computer era, and a revolutionary idea began to emerge in the small town of Bountiful, Utah.

Mike Wise, a young engineer and technology visionary, designed and built a modular microcomputer along with a handful of passionate associates. Even though the notion of a desktop personal computer didn't really yet exist, that's what the Sphere 1 looked like. It's instantly recognizable to us today as fitting the mold—but the Sphere, more or less, helped carve that mold. Turn on the power, and it booted up to a blinking cursor in a few moments with an already-loaded programming environment. The Sphere was also affordable for an individual. There was nothing like it—when it worked.

But Mike had even bigger ambitions for Sphere Corporation. He had cut his teeth on IBM mainframes and DEC minicomputer technology, and had an intuitive sense of what the brand-new microprocessor chips coming to market could enable people to achieve.

But before Sphere could realize Mike's dreams, the company unraveled, leaving behind almost no trace in the annals of computing history—a footnote here and there, or the quickest name-check aside in Bill Gates's recent autobiography.

Mike Wise and Sphere were largely forgotten, but the man, his vision, and his computer are worth remembering. *Go Computer Now! How Sphere Corporation Invented the Modern Microcomputer—Then Disappeared* tells the story of a computer, a company, and a community of pioneers at the dawn of the personal computing age.
